his year—the year of COVID—was the most challenging time many of us have ever experienced. At AFABC, we faced that challenge with a strong sense of purpose, and with the perseverance, adaptability, and resilience that is characteristic of our team, and the community we serve.

This year, the adoption and permanency community needed us as never before. We **accelerated our move to virtual service**, accessible across BC, and our community met us online. We also saw increased interest from the public in adoption and permanency. We believe the pandemic may have provided time for people to reflect and act on their interest in adopting. This is good news for BC's waiting kids.

We embraced opportunities to share our strengths and resources with other organizations. We know we have knowledge that can benefit not only adoptive families, but all the other kinds of families providing stability and permanency to kids. We were delighted, for instance, to offer our Safe Babies online course to several groups of foster parents, and we hope to do much more of this.

In partnership with the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption, we celebrated our Wendy's Wonderful Kids team's contribution to **an incredible milestone: 10,000 kids have been adopted** because of the efforts of child-specific recruiters across North America. We piloted our new Stepping Stones to Infinite Possibilities life skills curriculum with two partners, Archway Community Services and Easter Seals. These pilots were the the first steps to building a high quality, provincially-approved program that can be offered at low cost to youth-serving organizations across BC. We have many other pilot projects on the go, as we explore new ways to provide more targeted recruitment, most-needed family support services, and stronger research to inform our work.

One of the biggest questions we ask ourselves at AFABC is what role we can and should play to support the welfare of Indigenous children, youth and families. It is **our sincere desire to contribute to reconciliation**, and we know we have a lot of listening and learning to do. We are most grateful to be guided by our friends at the Indigenous Perspectives Society, who have been working with our entire Board and staff to help us develop our cultural competency, and an informed path forward.

We continue to upgrade and streamline our technology and systems for the future, and prepare for re-accreditation through COA, an important endorsement of our organizational strength.

We're also preparing to revitalize our profile and expand our reach with **a new name, brand, and website** to reflect our service to a wider community, including permanency families of all kinds, and youth in and from government care. We look forward to engaging our stakeholders in this process in the year ahead.

We are fortunate to have all this good work powered by stable, ongoing funding from the Ministry of Children and Family Development, the Dave Thomas Foundation for Adoption, other wonderful foundations and grantors, and individual donors whose lives we've touched (see page 23).

Thank you, from all of us at AFABC, and from all those we serve.



2020 was tough.

But we were tougher.

In 2020, we became math teachers and reading tutors. Our kitchens became science labs, the neighbourhood park the school gym. Messes were made, and sometimes cleaned up. When all else failed, we played in the mud. Through it all, AFABC families showed strength and compassion in the face of adversity. Every day, they made us proud to call ourselves champions and cheerleaders for the adoption and permanency community across BC. Throughout the pandemic, we drew our inspiration from them, and from the kids they love and nurture.

COVID was especially hard for nonprofits, but AFABC didn't just survive COVID, we got stronger. We pivoted and adapted and innovated and grew our capacity. We pulled together as a team in the face of much uncertainty, and are emerging from this challenging period with greater confidence.

Inquires about the Adopt BC Kids program doubled, and we doubled the number of adoption information sessions to accommodate this demand. Registrations for the 16-week Adoption Education Program went up by 14%. Over 300 new members joined one of our online support groups.

We showed up for youth in and from care as never before. Our AgedOut.com website exceeded 5,500 registered users—a 22%

increase—with almost 3000 users/month. Through this trusted platform, we provided young people with timely updates on enhanced government COVID supports as they were offered throughout the year. In partnership with the Children's Aid Foundation of Canada, we were able to disburse COVID emergency funding directly to over 230 young people.

2020 was a challenging year for many of us, but AFABC didn't just survive the past year, we thrived. **With an amazing group of supporters**—cherished donors, volunteers, partners and members—we continue to pursue our dream of family for every child.

Laura and Joel's social worker had suggested other potential matches, but something about their sons' profile grabbed their attention: two brothers with mischievous grins, described as high-energy adventure seekers. "We were in the position to adopt two children and thought, 'Well, here they are!"

Like many families built through adoption and permanency, big feelings, big questions, and trauma triggers are everyday things in the Lafortune home. But the best part of the journey has been watching their boys' confidence grow. Now 12 and 11, the boys walk tall and

speak their minds. The Lafortunes credit lots of counselling and plenty of shared activities for helping them stick to an everyday routine that allowed them to build the strong, resilient family unit they have today.



Every year, approximately 500 youth turn 19 and "age out" of government care in BC. AFABC helps them navigate a wide variety of supports through our comprehensive AgedOut.com website and Stepping Stones to Infinite Possibilities lifeskills training. Through the Howard Legacy Youth Fund Bursary and other bursaries, we help youth in and from care achieve their post-secondary dreams. And through our recruitment efforts, we find families for older youth in foster and other forms of government care.

Alfredo and Nozomi's paths crossed when both started their studies at UBC. Despite the fact they were in different departments, they ended up in the same dorm for graduate students on UBC campus.

They adopted their son, M, through the Adopt BC Kids program when M was a toddler. They were told M was a shy, quiet child, who might experience speech delays. Today, the Franco Ceas have no concerns about M's development. "He doesn't stop [speaking]!" says mom Nozomi, laughing. Currently, the Franco Ceas are waiting to welcome their second child home through the Adopt BC Kids program.


How has AFABC made a difference to your family?
